REFLECTIONS ON 2020

This is AWARE's first written annual report and what a year to start! Reflecting on 2020 brings a mix of emotions - a sentiment which we know is shared by many in the community.

As an organization, AWARE went through many of the same challenges as others with program 'pivots' to online delivery, temporary team layoffs and challenges reworking a model we had been rapidly growing over the last 5 years. As with many disruptions though, there was also opportunity, and thanks to social media (and zoom!) we connected with new audiences and hosted online events bigger than we would normally have in person. Operational challenges aside, our focus remained the same putting those resources we did have to the highest and best use for the Whistler community and nature.

From the early stages of COVID, there was increased recognition of the value of time spent in nature. Nature provided safe spaces to stay active, an abundance of activities for those off work, space to let go of the stresses of the moment and boost our mental health - and all for free. Yet this also put pressure on natural areas, waterways and wildlife as the knowledge-base and sheer number of people getting outside exponentially shifted. In response, we increased AWARE's advocacy efforts, with a focus on supporting those with broader networks than our own, to feature educational messaging about how to tread lightly.

At the same time - with the pandemic impacting every aspect of economic and social systems - potentially transformational questions emerged around how COVID is creating an unprecedented opportunity for society to build back intentionally - to become more equitable, more climate resilient and more aligned with natural limits.

As we look towards recovery in Whistler, we hope AWARE's work is creating meaningful impact through our programs and elevating collective recognition that:

- As a community whose tourism economy is grounded in nature-based experiences, we must do more to give back to nature and to safeguard the ecosystems and habitats that support wildlife and non-anthropocentric values; and
- As a community where the need to address climate change is broadly accepted but repeatedly presented as a challenge, we can use this moment to reframe and recognize that mitigating and adapting for climate change in all aspects of how we live, work and play isn't a side-issue and will be vital to Whistler's future success.

The good news is that we know what needs to be done and we are a community that can act fast for the collective good - so our team reflects on 2020 with deep gratitude, cautious hope and a determination to stay focused on delivering solutions and giving nature a voice.

We are grateful to be able to operate on the shared, unceded territory of the Skwxwú7mesh and Líl 'wat Nations and we look forward to creating meaningful connections to the rightful stewards of this beautiful land in the years ahead.

GIVING NATURE A VOICE

For over three decades AWARE has worked to give nature a voice.

In 2020, the onset of the COVID pandemic added new advocacy needs relating to: increased demand for nature-based experiences and longer-term recovery strategies for Whistler. In parallel, we saw increased demand relating to many of issues we have been continually active on (waste, bears, forests, wildlands, climate action, etc).

The main avenues of our advocacy work continue to be through participation on advisory committees, partner working groups, inputing into policy development at all levels of government, as well as position statements, letters and conversations with decision makers and the community.

As AWARE's events-based social enterprise - which helps fund our advocacy work - remains on hold we want to thank all those who supported our advocacy-specific online fundraising campaign at the end of 2020.




2020 FINANCIAL REPORT

As for many organisations, businesses and members of the community the COVID pandemic meant 2020 was a challenging year from a fiscal perspective.

Revenue streams we had been working to grow year-on-year like our Zero Waste Heroes social enterprise, program participation fees and project related-contracts were all reduced, but we also reduced expenses and thanks to the Federal support programs ultimately, AWARE closed the 2020 year with a small surplus.
